## **Administrative Services**

During the week of November 11, Administrative Services along with Student Services held three "How to" training sessions for the campus on key processes in each area and how to fill out required paperwork for the many different requests. #### **Fiscal Services:**

- 2019-2200 Budget Just a friendly reminder to all departments to please review 2019-2020 budgets
  for accuracy and to make any necessary budget changes. For those with categorical or grant
  programs, make sure the budgets reflect the final program allocation as some may not have been
  finalized before the budget went to the Board for approval.
- 2018-2019 Year End Audit The auditors completed their second visit during the week of October 21 and are working on the draft of the 2018-2019 District audit report. Once they have a draft report prepared, the District's audit committee will review the report before it is submitted to the Board for approval at the December board meeting.
- 2019-2020 Projects The Fiscal Services Office has three separate consulting visits scheduled from
  December through February in order to move forward with a number of projects in Banner to help
  the Business Office gain some efficiencies and also provide managers and their staff with the ability
  to prepare and approve purchase orders on-line through self-service Banner.

**Food Services:** The Eagle Café and The Eagle Dining Hall will be closed November 28 – December 1 during the Thanksgiving Holiday weekend, and from December 14, 2019 through January 1, 2020 for scheduled maintenance, deep cleaning, and the winter break.

December 18, 19, and 20 the Custodial Staff will be cleaning and waxing the floors in the entire kitchen so there will be no access of any kind during those three days.

The Eagle Café will re-open January 2, 2020. From January 2 – 24, staff will be serving from the Eagle Café (Grill) only. There will be no weekend service or dinner service during Winter Intersession.

The Eagle Café and Eagle Dining Hall will resume regular hours, including weekend service, on January 25, 2020.

Counseling, Advising, and Special Support Services: November 12 was the Veteran's Resource Center Grand Opening – a space created to be a study center, resource center, and lounge, funded by the Chancellor's Office Veteran's Resource Center categorical funds. **Basecamp HQ:** Since opening Headquarters (HQ) at the beginning of the fall semester, the staff have been working hard to find an accurate way to track the number of students coming in for services. BIG thank you to Stephanie Wroten who came up with the idea of using Google forms to have students signin. During the first four days since implementing the new sign-in procedure, a total of 215 students used services provided by HQ. One advantage to the new sign-in procedure is having real time numbers and information regarding the reasons students are coming in, and that can help HQ grow to better meet the needs of students.

That being said, HQ is always looking for donations to help sustain the program. HQ will accept any and all donations ranging from canned foods, grains, and beans to oatmeal and Cup-O-Noodles. In addition to the food pantry, there is a variety of school supplies and personal hygiene products on hand for students in need. #### Instruction

**Nursing Program:** Submitted by Cora Brownell, Director of Nursing

The LVN class pinning ceremony is scheduled for Friday, December 13 beginning at 5 p.m. in the Theater. All are welcome to attend this special event.

Several seats have opened up in the next Vocational Nursing class scheduled to start in spring 2020. The application period started November 4 and will end November 15. Qualified applicants who do not place in the spring cohort will be placed on a wait list for the 2021-2022 cohort.

Applications received for the next LVN to RN class for 2020-2021 are currently in the transcript evaluation process. Once that process is completed, the applicants will be ranked according to the Nursing Program admission criteria, and those accepted will be notified. The class will start with the role transitions course (NURS 1021) on March 9, 2020 to be held Mondays and Tuesdays until the end of the spring semester.

A Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) course will be offered in spring 2020. The course will start January 27. All interested can enroll online. Anyone with questions should contact the Nursing Office by calling (530) 841-5929. An orientation for the CNA class will be given on January 6, 2020. Anyone interested in taking the course is strongly encouraged to attend the orientation. Please view the COS Nursing website or contact the Nursing Office at (530) 841-5929 with any information requests or questions.

An Intravenous Therapy and Blood Withdrawal class (NURS 0966) will be offered January 8 - 11, 2020, at the Yreka Campus. This course provides instruction for graduate vocational nursing students, licensed vocational nurses, and registered nurses in the proper procedures to start and maintain intravenous fluids, as well as techniques in blood withdrawal. At the completion of the course, those who have met eligibility and course completion requirements will receive a certificate in IV Therapy/Blood Withdrawal issued through the Board of Vocational Nursing and Psychiatric Technicians.
