

Associated Student Board (ASB): Students held their spring Senator and Student Trustee elections at the end of April. There are several Senator 'seats' still vacant for the fall term. This year's nominee is Selena Johnson, who will be sworn in during the June Board of Trustees meeting.

Facilities: Update on projects:

- The Soccer Field Renovation Project is moving along nicely with the addition of a score board at the southeast area of the renovated field.
- The earthwork phase for the new Football practice field project has been awarded; work will begin in this area within the next week or two.
- The Fire Tower Prop Project is in the second week of advertising. A Mandatory Pre-Bid Meeting was held May 12 at the project site. Bid openings are May 26, with a Special Board Meeting scheduled to award the bid winner on May 26.



• Theatre Project estimators and consultants were on site Friday, May 7 and completed a thorough investigation of the Theatre building, which included Life Fire Safety, structural, and hazardous materials. The reports will be available in two weeks.

Fiscal Services: It's budget preparation season at Siskiyous! Thank you to the budget managers and their staff for all of the work you have done to provide information for the 2021-2022 budget development. Fiscal Services is reviewing all the department information in order to prepare a first draft of the 2021-2022 Tentative Budget to be presented to the IPB Committee, College Council and eventually to the Board of Trustees at the June 2021 Board meeting.

As we approach the end of the spring semester and 2020-2021 fiscal year end, please continue to check budgets and expenditures for the current year. If you have any budget or expenditure changes, please submit the approved forms to the Business Office. If you have any questions, email Kent Gross (gross@siskiyous.edu).

Some housekeeping:

- The purchasing cutoff date was April 16. The only exceptions are for perishable items (i.e. cafeteria, etc.) and emergencies (i.e. maintenance, safety, etc.). Any requests (of any size) made after April 16, require a Vice President's signature in order to be considered for processing.
- PO's are being scanned into their numbered folders on the W: drive and the requester is being notified by email. If you need to find out your PO number, please refer to the training guide sent out in November. Original PO's will be in your mailbox on campus after they are signed. If you do not have access to the W: drive, contact Kent Gross, and he will request access for you.
- If you would like to receive your paycheck via direct deposit, you can access the Direct Deposit authorization form through mySiskiyous/Employee/Pay. Once you complete the form, please submit it to Human Resources to make the change.

Food Services: Food Services staff is preparing for summer conferences and working hard to keep service costs low as food and fuel prices are steadily increasing. The transition to grab-and-go weekend services, rather than prepared foods, has been helpful to the fiscal health of the auxiliary account. Finding staff to fill shifts is proving to be a challenge as the summer months approach. A few candidates have applied for temporary positions, and with so many businesses needing employees, we've missed out on filling some shifts. Cindy and her team have covered co-worker's absences and are working to fill permanent openings to meet the expected increase in demand as more students attend in-person classes in the fall.

Human Resources: Human Resources held EEO trainings on May 12 and 13, which allows us to add names to our EEO Representative list for future hiring committees. We appreciate everyone taking time out of their busy days to attend. At the Board meeting on May 18, we will be presenting our annual study session on EEO and Title IX. Huge shout out and thank you to HR staff for all their efforts during a very busy recruitment year. It takes a village!

Residence Life and Housing: Summer will be very busy as there are several conferences scheduled to be held at the college. There is still lodging availability for those camps or conferences that would like to stay on campus.

Currently, COS is hosting the National Outdoor Leadership School for two courses, Upward Bound, Santa Clara Vanguard Drum and Bugle Corps, and the National Speleological Society. Jazz and Show Choir will also be on campus this summer but do not need on-campus housing. All summer conference groups must follow Campus COVID-19 protocols, including a negative test or vaccination before the conference and daily wellness screening, wearing masks, and following social distancing guidelines.

Technology Services: The department will upgrade and reconfigure the HappyFox ticketing system in July to support its adoption of Information Technology Service Management (ITSM) for its processes. This reconfiguration will allow the department to better monitor and report on how well it resolves issues and fulfills requests. The reconfiguration will create small differences in how tickets are submitted. More information will be provided as we get closer to the upgrade.

The College is continuing its migration to a new firewall. For those using Virtual Private Networking (VPNs), this will require uninstalling your existing Cisco Any Connect VPN software and installing a new Palo Alto Global Protect VPN. IT will continue reaching out to VPN users to assist them in completing this change this summer.

Student Services

Basecamp HQ: Basecamp HQ remained open while the campus was is in Phase Red earlier this month to ensure that students have access to the food pantry and other resources. Staff continue to work closely with Rhonda Brown and Karen Bezzam to make sure that all students required to self-isolate or quarantine are provided with thermometers, food, and anything else they may need.

During the month of April, three Siskiyou Promise FAQ sessions were held over Zoom to provide our incoming Siskiyou Promise students and their parents with useful information to help them prepare for classes in the fall. While we normally conduct our SOAR sessions in person at our local high schools, this year we are doing everything using Canvas and Zoom. Students will complete the orientation portion of their SOAR session through Canvas and once that is complete they can make an appointment to meet with an advisor or counselor over Zoom to register for their fall classes. We look forward to welcoming our new group of Siskiyou Promise scholars to campus in the fall.

Counseling & Advising: Now that general registration is open for summer session and fall semester our Counseling and advising staff are very busy assisting students with registering for classes. As a reminder, our Drop-In Zoom waiting room is available Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Drop-In advising for brief advising or handling small questions is also available. Drop-In advising is not intended for Education Planning, complete schedule registration, etc. Drop-In advising can be used for switching classes, a change in major, adding/dropping a class, prerequisite questions, questions about progress/graduation, and to answer general information questions. Students wanting to register for classes will need to contact Counseling & Student Support Programs by calling (530) 938-5353 or emailing counselingservices@siskiyous.edu.

Disabled Student Programs and Services (DSPS): This month, we are shining the spotlight on Jason Scroggins who is graduating on May 21! Jason has received a Certificate of Achievement this month as special recognition of his ability to overcome barriers and achieve success. Jason was kind enough to share about his experience at the College of the Siskiyous and DSPS services.

"An unexpected road" - Hello everyone, my name is Jason Scroggins. I am majoring in the Social Sciences. An unexpected road brought me to COS when I could no longer work in my former profession. I felt the most import thing for me to do was to go back to school to find a new direction in my life.

As a student, with limitations and the need for accommodations, it's imperative to learn what resources are available. I am so grateful to the DSPS department at COS. It's an awesome feeling to know that the staff at DSPS "has your back."

They were able to find me funding for my education that would apply to me in my time of need. I always get so much encouragement from them if I need assistance about something or have questions about, well.... anything. They are a "vital resource" for us students to have so that we have an avenue to academic success and belonging as the rest of the student body.

Enrollment Services:

- Admissions and Records As of May 12, 273 students have registered for summer session classes and 217 students have registered for fall semester classes. Processing of K-12 registration began May 10. A high school partner from the Bay area is sending 72 students for summer registration. This is great news for us!
- **Financial Aid** IPB approved a Financial Aid Director position and an Office Assistant position. These two positions will be in addition to the two Student Services Specialist positions. Having a Financial Aid Director will allow necessary focus on specific processes to ensure continued compliance, and it will be a great service to students to have an adequately staffed Financial Aid Office. Huge thankyou to Meghan Witherell who has served as both the Director of Financial Aid and the Director of Admissions & Records/Registrar for the past year! We will be filling a Student Services Specialist position vacated by Parker Keim. We wish Parker well as they move to the TRiO Office, and want to express appreciation for Parker's contribution in staying current on the guideline, the awarding, and distribution of student CARES Act funds.

EOPS/CalWORKs: The EOPS Program is happy to announce its participants are eligible for up to \$300 worth of Grocery Outlet gift cards to help them purchase groceries. The students were notified and were very excited and thankful for this additional assistance. Due to the campus being closed, the gift cards were mailed to the students and so far, 63 students have taken advantage of this great opportunity.

EOPS staff has also been busy making sure that students complete their counselor contacts and have been preparing for the upcoming 'end of semester progress check-in's' that began May 10.

Over the years, EOPS and CalWORKs have purchased many graduation cap and gown packages for their students, and are still able to do so!

Val Roberts, Michelle Knudsen and Marlena Shaffer attended the California Community College CalWORKs Association Annual Training Institute which had the most registrants in its history, 613! It was a wonderful conference where the CalWORKs community came together after a tough year to support each other, brainstorm and problem solve.

Graduation/Commencement: On May 7, the college held its Graduation Drive Through Celebration / Parade with strict COVID-19 safety protocols. Accreditation Update - The Accreditation Steering Committee and Standard Team Members have been hard at work completing the Institutional Self Evaluation Report (ISER). The College is on-track to have a comprehensive draft prepared by mid-August 2021 (which includes evidence of meeting the standard, analysis and evaluation and hyperlinked evidence documents). The timeline for completion is as follows:

- Mid-August, 2021: Completion of comprehensive ISER draft and posting of draft on Accreditation webpage for public review/comment
- Mid-August February 1, 2022: ISER Editor to edit, review and format document into one cohesive 'voice'
- February 1, 2022: Finalized ISER placed on Participatory Governance agendas
- February 2022 May 2022: Vetting and approval of finalized ISER via Participatory Governance Groups
- July 2022: Submission of final, approved ISER to ACCJC
- Fall 2022 Semester: ACCJC Comprehensive Site Visit team review of ISER

• **Spring 2023:** ACCJC Comprehensive Site Visit team to meet with identified College of the Siskiyous employees

Academic Senate

As I scrolled through the notes and minutes from all of the committee, council, and individual meetings I've attended throughout the year; and as I think back all the way to last spring when we were confronted with a pandemic; and as I contemplate everything that we've been through as a campus, I'm overwhelmed by the commitment and passion of all of our full and part-time faculty here at the College of the Siskiyous.

So much has happened since the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year. For starters and for a bit of context...the College, Board of Trustees, and our Nation all had different presidents. And we were forging new ground as educators, seeking out innovative and creative ways to maintain a rigorous, student centered learning environment, in which our students felt valuable and valued. Almost overnight, we transformed our entire curriculum and course offerings to be delivered remotely, trying not to cringe when we heard the words synchronous and asynchronous for the 100th time in one week.

Yet, even before the school year began, we were fortunate to have Maria Fernandez leading the charge on the Distance Learning front. From the moment we realized we were facing a global pandemic, she was offering both guidance and guidelines to keep us in compliance with the ever-changing landscape surrounding online learning and instruction. Were it not for her diligence and dedication, there most certainly would have been courses (and students) that would have fallen through the cracks.

And while we were wrestling with the prospects of a fully online fall semester, the Nation was wrestling with issues of racism, equity, and social justice. Prompted by the deaths of black men and women in rapid succession around the country, a renewed and seemingly sustained prioritization toward confronting and dismantling the systems and institutions that maintain inequity permeated conferences, workshops, and trainings in all areas of education. Liz Carlyle, Neil Carpentier-Alting, and I witnessed it in the ASCCC Leadership Conference; and Katie Elwood, Michelle Knudsen, Neil Carpentier-Alting, and I witnessed it in the ASCCC Curriculum Institute in the summer of 2020. Figuring out what it means to "decolonize our higher education institutions" became the focus throughout the year at both the state and local levels, manifesting in statewide resolutions, local senate resolutions, and as we have seen here on campus, FLEX day activities and trainings that have included speaker Lasana Hotep, and the Peninsula Conflict Resolution Center. And yet, our progress thus far lives primarily on paper and in idea. As we look ahead to the 2021 school year, our priority as a Senate must be to animate the ideas put forth in our resolution in our courses, content, curriculum, and classroom. It is in these spaces where transformation occurs, and it is in these spaces, that we are obligated to be agents of change.

So, the school year began, and we as a Senate, identified our goals and priorities and by the end of the first semester we had made progress on a variety of projects including revision, review and approval of Administrative Procedures, Program Approval Processes, eLumen/curriculum workflows, the faculty handbook, faculty orientation, flex activities, enrollment management planning, hiring committees, Distance Education, and accreditation work, to name a few.

And now, we find ourselves at the end of the year, and as was shared earlier in the Committee Reports, our achievements and accomplishments as a faculty belie our size. We have delivered meaningful, rigorous, and relevant instruction to students. We have completed significant and observable work in areas of curriculum, Guided Pathways, Distance Education, Professional Development, and Governance, and we've established processes and procedures that will make progress on all projects in the future easier, more effective, efficient, and impactful.

We have accomplished great things this year. Yet, all that we have accomplished exists on a continuum. In reality, our work is always 'in progress.' The completed work now must turn into action, and the work in progress needs to be completed. And around the corner lies new and unseen challenges. And we will be ready. In our final Senate Executive Committee meetings this school year, we will be inventorying and assessing the work that has been done, and with input from the entire senate, create a new list of projects and goals to be prioritized when we reconvene in the fall. We will continue to innovate in the
