His research is especially concerned with the invention of appreciative nomenclature for inviting and engaging the transformative opportunities connected with healthier attitudes about conflict, as a dialogic and collaborative proposition. He is currently engaged in dissertation work for the completion of a doctoral degree in Educational Leadership at St. Mary's College of California.

Administrative Services

Administrative Services would like to wish each of you a very happy holiday season!

Facilities: Safety is a priority at the College of the Siskiyous and the Safety Committee is dedicated to constantly monitoring and improving procedures and communications on our campuses. Our Emergency 5911 line is monitored 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by Facilities and Lodge personnel, during regular operational days of the academic calendar. It is important to know when to use 5911 verses 911 and SchoolDude.

When to call... 5911 - In the event of a **Maintenance or Custodial non-medical emergency** on the Weed or Yreka campus please call 5911. It can also be used for the Safe Walk Program if you would like an escort on campus, Monday through Thursday 3 to 10:30 p.m. and Friday, 3 to 6:30 p.m.

- **Safety** – door locks, broken windows, gas leaks, strange noises in the attic or walls, etc.
- **Electrical** – lighting and power outages
- **Plumbing** – bathroom, leaks/flooding
- **Grounds** – trip/fall hazards, icy walkways, fallen trees or limbs

When to call... 911 Emergency - In the event of an **immediate medical emergency requiring assistance** from the police, fire department or an ambulance please bypass 5911 and call 911.

- **Fire**
- **Injury**
- **Crime**
- **Automobile accident**
- **Behavior issues** – disruptive, yelling, fighting, threatening, strange, weapons, etc.
- **Animal issues** – unattended, dangerous, wounded, etc.
- **Other related issues**

If you call 911 be prepared to state the location, nature of the emergency, and if known, other details such as physical descriptions, injuries and symptoms.

Food Services: Staff in Food services are getting ready for an important upgrade. The replacement of the kitchen floor will take place over the winter break and into January. This project will take approximately (5) weeks and students staying on campus during winter intersession will have access to local restaurants and grocery stores to help meet their nutritional needs.

Lodges: Lodge staff are accepting applications related to on campus housing for the spring 2022 term through the winter intersession allowing students more time to apply before the start of the semester. End of fall semester activities for lodge students include pancake breakfast, dodgeball, casino night, and holiday films trivia.

Technology Services: The department is currently developing its Operational Plan for FY22-23. The plan will be reviewed by the Technology Advisory Committee in February and it is expected that it will be published in February/March after going through the governance process.

Technology Services initiated a process to formally define the process for provisioning new users (both employees and students) as well as de-provisioning users when they are no longer with the College. We will be coordinating with other departments throughout the process. The College has launched a project to identify and implement a single solution for all electronic signatures used by the College. A project team has been formed to define the requirements, evaluate and select a solution, and then implement that solution throughout the College.

Admissions and Records: Admissions and Records are excited to announce that students will be able to order their COS transcripts through the National Student Clearinghouse starting Monday, December 6th. Alum who attended COS prior to 1990 will need to still complete a paper request until their microfiche transcripts can be entered into banner.

In other news Michael Kellogg is our new Student Services Specialist in Admissions and Records, and transcript evaluations are coming in at a steady pace. We are hoping to start the implementation of the new Admissions home page to make the steps clearer for enrollment in January for the upcoming 22/23 year.

Basecamp HQ: As the holidays approach Basecamp has seen an increase in the number of students seeking transportation assistance. With gas being so expensive, these vouchers have been very helpful, especially in helping students travel home for the holidays. Most of our Eagle Ambassadors were able to go home for Thanksgiving and see family and friends, which they were all very excited about.

The Eagle Ambassadors have been working diligently on rearranging Basecamp to provide more services to students. This includes expanding our pantry and snack area. We are working to keep the fridge, freezer, pantry, and snacks stocked. We all know that as the semester comes to a close, meal points run out and we don't want any student to go without. We are preparing for the end of the semester and are working on getting laptops returned or renewed for the winter intersession.

EOPS: EOPS is excited to announce that the Program was able to give our students \$100 Grocery Outlet gift cards again this semester! The students were extremely thankful to receive them prior to the holidays.

The EOPS Counselors have been booked meeting with students for their 2nd Counselor contact where they help the students to register for the spring term, as well as address any other academic needs/questions that the students have. In addition to the counselor contacts, the students are also completing their End of semester Progress check-in online and are eligible for another \$25 gas voucher once that is completed.

Financial Aid: The state of California released the first ever list of potential recipients of California Community College Entitlement Award! The award can go to Cal Grant eligible community college students and potentially follow those who transfer to a CSU or UC. Through the diligent efforts of our specialist, Haley Pope, nearly all candidates had their eligibility confirmed and added to their award package in time for a fall disbursement. Eligible students will have their loans reduced, payments credited towards their balance, or receive direct funds by December 10th. We hope this support makes a difference for students and families in time for the winter break.

We are bidding farewell to our valued team member, Patricia Bird. Her skills, dedication and friendly demeanor was appreciated by staff and students alike. We wish her the best of fortune in her future endeavors!
