March is Women's History Month! In 1978, Women's History Month started as Women's History Week by the Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commissions on the Status of Women. In 1980, the National Women's History Alliance successfully lobbied for national recognition and, the president at that time, Jimmy Carter, issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the week of March 8th as National Women's History Week. It wasn't until Congress passed Public Law designating March as Women's History Month in 1987. This year's Women's History Month theme is: *Providing Healing, Promoting Hope.*

Additionally, March 8th is International Women's Day. This year's theme is #BreakTheBias which celebrates women's achievements, raises awareness against bias and asks that individuals take action for equality. 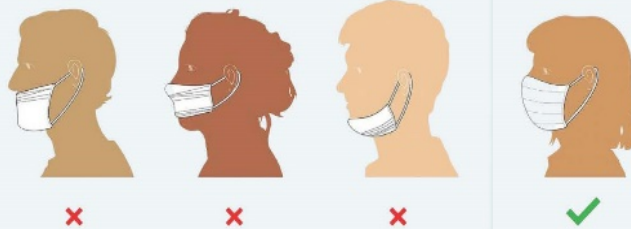

The Bookstore has sold 49 eBook subscriptions for the Spring 2022 semester. This is an increase from 41 subscriptions in Fall 2021.

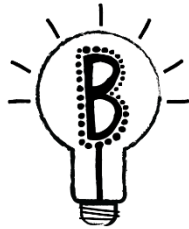
Thank you to Basecamp HQ for providing students with assistance in order to obtain textbooks for so many of our students this semester!

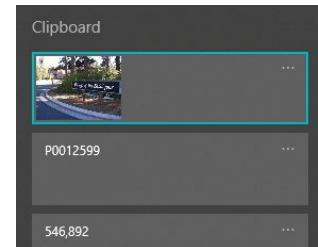
Technology Services: The College has completed its upgrade of the wireless network in the Lodges, increasing coverage and improving performance.

In other news, we are currently setting up for the opening of registration for the Summer and Fall semesters. Students can begin applying at any time.

EOPS/CARE and CalWORKs: The EOPS office has been busy with students completing their counselor contacts and progress check-ins. With one week to go, 93% of our students have already completed their counselor contacts! Progress check-ins are going well with 76% of our students having completed them already and still a week to go. Through the Progress check-ins and Counselor contacts, students are receiving assistance with education planning and are being connected to resources if they are struggling in any of their courses. With gas prices rising, the students have also been very thankful for the gas cards that they receive through the EOPS program.

CCCEOPSA calendars were mailed out to all California Community Colleges and COS's own Paola Machuca, who received the CCCEOPSA scholarship this year for Region 1, was pictured! Congratulations again Paola!

The CalWORKs program is continuing to grow with referrals still coming in weekly from the county. We were excited to help a handful of our CalWORKs students purchase required art supplies for their Art and ECE classes through the Velvet Elephant in Mt. Shasta. The students were very appreciative and excited!

Financial Aid: HEERF3 funds from the CARES act have been disbursed for spring and students should be able to view on their account by Friday March 11, and available to them the following next week. Cal Grants and Student Success and Completion Grants have also been distributed.

Full time students with dependents may qualify for additional SSCG funds. If such a student has been awarded a "tentative" SSCG from the state of California but has not yet been paid in full, they should log in to their web grants portal to verify their dependents. Please have them contact the Financial Aid Office immediately if they have difficulties. They will lose eligibility for additional funds as of **March 17**.

We are excited to welcome our new Office Assistant II to the department within the next two weeks. Introductions to come. We know this will be of great help to our students as we prepare to process aid applications for the 2022-2023 Award Year!

On top of working at College of the Siskiyous, Sami is also a full-time online student at Southern Oregon University where she is working on her Bachelor of Science in Innovation and Leadership. After changing her major one too many times, she is happy to have finally found a major that she enjoys as well as fits effortlessly into her lifestyle, beliefs, and work ethic. Sami is excited to continue her journey with College of the Siskiyous as the Curriculum Specialist and can't wait to see what the future has in store.

2021-22 Online Catalog: Congratulations and thank you so much to Nancy Miller and Sami Donaldson for their extreme dedication, thoroughness and hard work producing our first online catalog. Please see Nancy's announcement below.

We are excited to be unveiling the 2021-2022 online catalog produced from course and program data within Elumen.

An Introduction - Course and program (degree and certificate) information is the bulk of the catalog information and is stored in three different software systems:

- **Elumen**--the College's curriculum software where faculty initiate courses and programs and they go through an established approval process;
- **Chancellor's Office Curriculum Inventory (COCI)** – the state's curriculum information software where all California Community College curriculum information is stored;
- **Ellucian/Banner** - the College's integrated management software, where course and program information is entered in order to schedule classes, administer prerequisites, award degrees, collect fees, etc.

Because the systems noted above are not integrated, manual entry of data into each software system is required. Therefore, it is imperative that the information in the three systems gets updated as changes are made to courses and programs.

The Journey to the On-Line Catalog - It has been a goal of Academic Affairs to look at ways of automating processes when possible, especially as staffing in the department went from 3 to 1 for a while.

- Looking into the possibility of producing an online catalog, began a little over a year ago; and as staffing has been restored in the department, we were able to really dig into the process of producing our first ever fully online catalog.

- Course and program data pulls directly from Elumen into the online catalog. This helps to ensure less data entry errors when the courses were pulling from Banner into the catalog, and then a lot of manual manipulation and graphic design work was required to produce the printed catalog.

The Beginning - Prior to Spring 2021:

Dr. Perlas identified funds necessary to obtain the catalog software from Elumen. A flex activity was held for faculty to identify the order in which students should complete the required classes for their degrees and certificates.

- 2020-2021:
 - Curriculum tracking processes were established and implemented by Nancy Miller to provide accurate information about where in the approval process courses were as well as ensure that all steps had been completed including entering into the 3 software systems. There are 20 steps in this process and ensuring each step is imperative in keeping data in the three systems accurate.
 - During this timeframe, approximately 250 courses were either revised, proposed or deactivated in Elumen. Of those courses, about 73% were approved through the curriculum process. This means that there was a lot of curriculum clean-up was completed so that data going into the 2021-2022 catalog would be more accurate. Thank you faculty and Curriculum Committee!
- Spring 2021:
 - A team was assembled (Nancy Miller, Gabbi Aston, and Anne Marie Acord) to enter degrees and certificate information into Elumen. This information included information on the order in which students should complete their courses in order to obtain their degree or certificate. This is the first time this information will appear in the catalog.
 - Nancy Miller worked with faculty to verify the information entered for their programs.
 - A temporary employee was hired, Sami Donaldson, and she began training in all things curriculum, and took over administrative support of the Curriculum Committee.
 - Information was sent out to departments responsible for “catalog front pages” (i.e., information included in the catalog that is not about courses or programs).
 - Work began on the learning about the Elumen online catalog and how it works.
 - Courses were imported from Elumen into the catalog.

The Middle - Fall 2021:

- Catalog style and template pages were built with the assistance of Anne Marie Kuhlemann, Michael Reetz, and Max Michelin.
- Sami Donaldson, who is a current college student and brings a student perspective to this work, dove into the building/designing of the catalog pages and navigation for the online catalog. Examples of other online catalogs were viewed as well as consultation with Val Roberts and Josh Collins regarding the layout was invaluable as well. Sami was tireless and fearless as she tried different ways to layout the information, ran into some challenges, but always kept working towards the end goal of publishing the online catalog.
- Sami Donaldson and Nancy Miller, did one last verification of program information and worked with the area deans and faculty as needed to troubleshoot any issues that were found.

- When programs were initially entered in Elumen there were 93 degrees and certificates. Upon completion of the verification of the data on programs, there are 75 degrees and certificates are included in the 2021-2022 catalog. The breakdown is below.
 - 21: Associate of Art Degrees
 - 13: Associate of Science Degrees
 - 8: Associate of Arts Degrees for Transfer
 - 6: Associate of Science Degrees for Transfer
 - 13: Certificate of Achievement
 - 8: Certificate of Completion (Non-Credit)
 - 6: Local Certificates

The End - Spring 2022:

- Verification of data began to compare the data in Elumen with the stated approved information in COCI. This was imperative to ensure the accuracy of catalog data, which is our contract without students.
- During the verification process we uncovered some inaccuracies that needed to be corrected before we published the catalog. It felt like we were peeling back layers of an onion, and we didn't stop until we got to the core. This took longer than anticipated, but was worth the work.
- When data was pulled from COCI there were 681 active classes, but about 20 less in Elumen. After completing the verification which included conversations with faculty, deans, and researching curriculum and Board minutes, we ended up with 618 active courses in catalog.
- Catalog addendums will be produced at regular intervals for any updates that happen before we publish the next catalog.

The Future

- Now that we have processes in place to verify information, and our first online catalog has published, production of the next catalog will be much more efficient.
- Work will start almost immediately, because our goal is to produce next year's catalog by the end of June 2022 prior to the upcoming Fall semester. This will give students registering for Fall 2022 access to the catalog information for the 2021-2022 year.
- During our data verification, we have identified some things in COCI that need some clean up. That work will also begin immediately.
- In Spring/Summer 2022 we will work on ensuring that our banner data matches our COCI/Elumen data.

Thank you to everyone who assisted with this project, and especially to Mark Klever for his encouragement and patience as we ran into a few bumps in the road at the end.
