### Financial Aid:

- February collection for IPEDS survey successfully locked for submission by the Chancellor’s Office.
- During the Week of Welcome, TRiO organized a FAFSA Fryday event. Attendees were able to finish the FAFSA process with assistance from both departments. A follow-up event will be held on February 22 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. with tacos served. Many thanks for the TRiO and Basecamp assistance!
- All students are encouraged to fill out their **2023-2024 FAFSA** before **March 2, 2023**, in order to be eligible for 2023-2024 Cal Grant awards.
- One-time grant for HEERF funding housing grant to lodge residents will be applied to new ‘move-ins’ at census.
- Last day to submit a ‘spring only’ or ‘combined attendance’ for fall and spring attendance is **April 25, 2023**.
- Cal Grant and Student Success Completion Grants are scheduled for disbursement on **March 3, 2023**.
- First-time borrowers who started in spring 2023 will have loan disbursements go out on **March 17, 2023**.

**Outreach and Recruitment:** This past winter/holiday season was very busy in the Outreach and Recruitment office. On November 29, 2022, the campus had the experience of beading with the Karuk Tribe. They have asked to have events on campus monthly and will assist with tribal items for the John Mantle Student Center this month.

- Open up your My Siskiyou page.
- Under Work Request, click on Maintenance & Facilities. This will take you to School Dude page.
- Click link for Maintenance Service Requests.
- Log in. If you do not have a login, please call maintenance to set you up in the system.
- Click New Work Order tab.
- Select status as new request.
- Select your Priority.
- Next, select your location, building and write a description of your request.
- Add your contact information from the drop-down list.
- For Assigned to drop down, if your work order request is custodial (cleaning, tables, paper, etc.) you can pick Maria Ferrasci. All other requests you pick Veronica Rivera and we will assign the request to a maintenance tech.
- Once your request is complete, the submittal password is "password."

**Technology Services:** The department is working with the Academic Senate to launch a Classroom\Lab Improvements project. This project will (1) define the classroom\lab service within the Technology Services Portfolio, (2) define and deploy classroom\lab standard(s), and (3) refresh all classroom\lab technology equipment over the next 3-4 years. 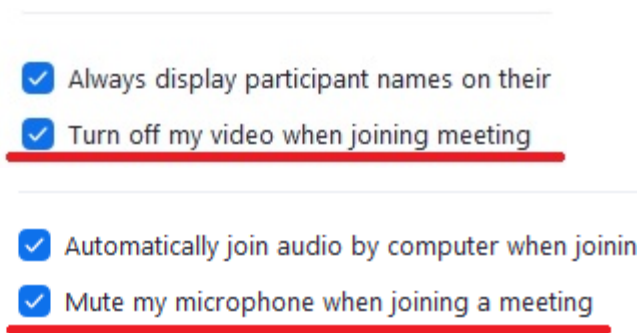
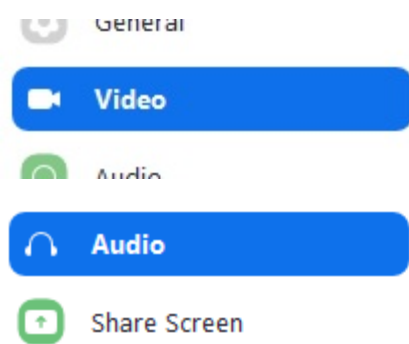
Working with Facilities, we have completed an upgrade to a server-based system for managing the College's HVAC system.

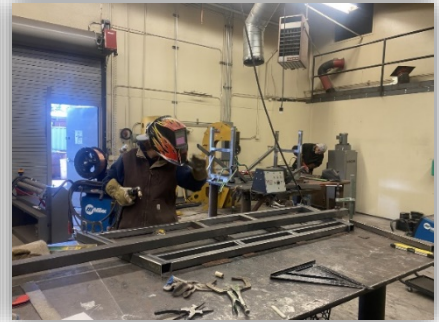
### **Career Center** – *submitted by Brenda Collins, Coordinator*

The Fire Program has been very busy over the last month. Fire Academy #44 is entering its ‘live-fire’ phase. This past week, the Cadets learned how to deal with liquid and gas fires. Cadets have already participated in the following Firefighter training classes: State Fire Training Certified Testing for Firefighter 1 and Firefighter 2 for our surrounding Departments, Rapid Intervention Crew Class (Firefighters rescuing Firefighters), and Rope Rescue Awareness/Operations. We have also begun our Fire Technology classes for those working towards a Fire Science Degree, and are happy to announce Fire Technology now offers an ONLINE option.

The online courses for the Administration of Justice (ADJ) Program seem to be a popular option, as many new students have stated their major is ADJ! These courses appeal not only to those majoring in Criminal Justice, but those who are pursuing a law degree. Administration of Justice courses include an in-depth study of legal concepts, rules of evidence, Constitutional considerations, and California law. Instructor, Leigh Moore reports, "It is very exciting to have a broad depth of interest. Our courses have students interested in law enforcement, those who intend to pursue a law degree at the university level, and students considering if Criminal Justice is the major for them! Classes are large (averaging over 20 students) and include numerous high school students interested in learning more, as well as those who are currently in the justice field. This provides students a wonderful experience because each student enriches the learning environment, and we learn from each other as we explore and research the many concepts in this discipline. I couldn't be more excited about the new semester!"





**Early Childhood Education (ECE) Program – submitted by Patrice Thatcher-Stephens**

The Discovery Child Development Center (Building 9) began a new era with the 2022 fall semester. The Child Development, Family and Education Program “ECE@COS” is collaborating with Siskiyou Child Care Center to offer a full or part day early education program to local families and a Lab School Observation and Practicum site for our students.

The SCCC-DCDC is licensed by the State of California and offers California State Preschool spaces. As we enter Spring Semester 2023, we welcome back our returning program students as Student Workers, and prepare to provide Practicum experience for some of those enrolled in ECE 2502, offer Observation opportunities for ECE 1501, a beautiful learning environment for evening ECE 1500 students, and space for ECE 2510 students to scaffold creative art activities for young children.

ECE@COS continues to work with California’s amazing early education network as SCCC-DCDC staff is coached locally by experienced early educators through the Siskiyou County Office of Education’s Local Planning Counsel and First 5 Siskiyou as part of Quality Count Siskiyou. Mentor teachers, funded through the California Early Childhood Mentor Program, will work with any Practicum students placed at SCCC-DCDC.

We are working locally with the Siskiyou County Office of Education (SCOE) on the Universal Preschool Advisory Committee to align courses and pathways offered at COS with the changes that will support the development of fully qualified Transitional Kindergarten-TK teachers and align with California Community College classes supporting requirements for the upcoming Preschool to Third Grade- P3 credential. We will start to put this new set of classes in place as soon as SCOE adopts this Commission on Teacher Credentialing recommended pathway.

Carl Perkins funding, as well as yearly District funds, provided financial support for some necessary improvements in our almost 30-year old DCDC building. Most importantly, we were able to invest in a developmentally appropriate and beautiful redesign of the environment. The COS Maintenance Department went above and beyond in assisting our work! Future planning includes work with COS IT to create a multi-use space that includes a Smart Classroom as we appropriately reimagine our long time, pre-COVID, Face-to-Face/Video conference classes meshing with online classes to meet the needs of our students. Teaching, in the evenings, from an actual early education program will expand and support our curriculum and degree process.

It truly does take caring individuals, a supportive CTE Area and college, a dedicated community, a resilient state and a country that values its children and families to get us all through. Thanks to all in the COS community and beyond who continue to support ECE@COS.

# Academic Senate

Hello Everyone. Welcome to the Spring Semester!

I would like to recognize outgoing VPAS, Dave Vigo. During the last IPB meeting, Dave gave an engaging presentation on the status of the Hold Harmless provisions; the state of the 50% Law; and proposed an outline for the budget timeline going forward. His presentation on these issues was refreshing because he was transparent and open. His presentation provided firm numbers on the current State of the College and what we can expect going forward. Dave expertly explained the cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) and how these adjustments in funding accumulate over time (i.e., they do not go away after one year). In addition, there had been fears among many at the College that we would experience a financial crisis when the hold harmless provisions expire in 2025-26. Dave explained the “funding floor” established in the fiscal year 2025-2026 would not result in a dramatic change in funding. In addition, he was straightforward about the College’s 50% Law issue and indicated that the Administration is working with the Faculty Union to remedy this issue. Finally, he presented a clear vision of how he wanted to approach budgetary planning and allocation for the year. Dave welcomed any questions we had and addressed each one. At the end of the meeting, attendees were thanking Dave for his presentation and people came away feeling informed about our current financial standing at the College. My colleagues and I were sad to learn that Dave has resigned. We hope the interim VPAS recently hired will continue this transparency and openness on the College’s financial matters.

This month’s Faculty Member Highlight is Jenny Heath, Chemistry Instructor. Jenny has been working with Butteville Elementary to introduce second graders to Chemistry. On February 10, she gave a Chemistry demonstration during their Science period. Coming up, on February 17, the students will be taking a field trip to the Science building at COS to learn more about Science and Chemistry. Thank you, Jenny, for making connections with other local educators and introducing young people to Science and our College.

Finally, I am pleased to announce the College has received 279 responses on the Course Modality Student Preference Survey, thus far. Notably, the students who prefer online courses vs those who prefer face-to-face courses is closer than I expected. Currently, 53% of our students report they prefer online courses, whereas 44% of students say they prefer in-person courses (only 2% preferred Zoom courses). These survey results confirm our students want robust online offerings, but also opportunities to take face-to-face courses.
