PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Graduation Season" has passed and we have completed another year here at the foot of the mountain. This has been a great year for College of the Siskiyous and our students.

Please take a few moments to review the many accomplishments of our students and staff in this report. While there is much left to be done, it is appropriate to take a little time to review the progress we have made during the past year.

Getting a job in their chosen field is one of the most important measures of success for our students. Once again this year, our students did very well. A few illustrations of this can be seen in the most recent graduating classes of the Fire Academy. Of 31 graduates in the 2003 class, all were employed in the field. The 2004 class that just completed their training last month, has had 25 graduates placed already, with the expectation that the remaining

students will find jobs soon. Our new Paramedic Program placed 20 of its first graduates almost immediately with the remaining seven having job offers within a short time. In our other health science programs virtually 100% of our CNA and Nursing graduates are employed upon graduation.

This has also been a banner year for COS students wishing to pursue a bachelor's degree. We continue to transfer students to many of the campuses in the CSU and UC systems. Many of our students are opting to attend either Southern Oregon University and Oregon Institute of Technology, both of which are located just across the state border to our north. This year for the first time Southern Oregon University began offering a bachelor's degree in Business at our Yreka facility. Siskiyou County residents now have the opportunity to pursue their education through the bachelor's completion degree program without leaving our beautiful community.

I believe that if you take the time to review this report you will be impressed with the accomplishments of our staff and students. I know that I am proud to be associated with them.




