

Content: This course covers the fundamentals of the Camtasia Studio capture software. Camtasia Studio is a software program that captures movies of the computer monitor display, including audio and picture-in-picture, which can then be produced into a variety of formats for posting on the web. The student will learn about the various features of Camtasia software and which features are best suited for their use.

1. Understand Camtasia's role in e-learning.
2. Capture a typical lecture or demonstration using Camtasia.
3. Post a lecture or demonstration on the Web.

Projects: This is a project based class. There will be 5 projects plus a final project.
