College of the Siskiyous Awarded \$32 million Student Housing Grant!

Late Thursday, June 30, Governor Newsom signed the 2022-2023 State Budget. The 2022-2023 budget included one-time awards to selected community colleges for housing projects deemed eligible for funding in the first round of applications submitted in October 2021. College of the Siskiyous is one of four eligible community colleges and was awarded \$32 million to build a new, on-campus, 76 unit/252 bed student housing complex! We are beyond excited to commence construction and look forward to serving more students with this new housing complex!

Theater Renovation Proposal – Approved!

The College's Theater Renovation proposal has been approved and we are preparing to move forward with the proposed renovations. Weekly meetings with ALMA Strategies, the College's Facilities consultant, are scheduled to commence on July 12, 2022.

\$18.13 Million Dollar K-16 Education Collaborative Grant Awarded

In collaboration with North State Together, the North State Community Economic Resiliency Fund (CERF) area, which includes Siskiyou County, was awarded the K-16 Grant totaling \$18.13 Million. Through Cradle to Careers for Siskiyou, the College of the Siskiyous Foundation will be receiving \$1.1 mil over four years.



California Medical Scholars Grant

College of the Siskiyous is one of eight UC Davis partner colleges eligible to send students through UC Davis's pathway to medical school. Administrative Services

Facilities and Maintenance: Update on current and future projects.

- The Football Stadium road replacement project is half complete and looking good. The Fire Academy access road repair and sealing will begin soon after the Stadium road replacement project is complete.
- Speed Tables have been installed and are a great reminder to slow down when you pass the Discovery Child Development Center facility.



- Fascia replacement on both lodges is complete. Many areas of dry rot were discovered during the removal
 of the old fascia and were repaired during the process. Repair and coating of the lodge roofs is scheduled to
 take place the week of July 11-15.
- The LRC roof coating project is complete.
- Yreka building 85 Technology Center painting project is complete. New forward throw lights for better illumination of the area have been added and the building looks great.
- Physical Science and Eddy Hall exterior painting projects will begin before the end of July.
- The Air Conditioning project in the kitchen area is in the bidding process.
- The Student Center boiler replacement project is moving forward and will begin in approximately four to six weeks upon the delivery of the new boiler to the campus.

- The Discovery Center and Ponderosa Hall flooring projects will begin soon and are estimated to be completed before the end of July.

Technology Services: In an effort to improve the College's cyber security, Technology Services will be implementing two-factor authentication for employees who are accessing COS resources from outside the COS network on August 8. We will be sending out information concerning this change and how to prepare for it in the month of July. We will also be providing training during the FLEX training prior to the fall term.

The department has started the process of migrating most of the virtual servers currently hosted on premise to the Microsoft Azure cloud. This will improve the level of service while also reducing costs and the College's carbon footprint.

Beginning this summer and carrying through the end of the academic year, the department will be implementing a workstation standard on all employee computers. This standard will ensure that all systems are running current software, properly secured, and easily recoverable. We will be reaching out to all departments to schedule times to implement this standard that minimizes disruptions to their operations.

Academic Affairs

The Office of Academic Affairs is welcoming the summer session. Although life on campus does not stop, this summer has been a much welcomed time to get caught up and refresh plans for the fall semester.

With numerous challenges still facing the college, it feels good to have more solid approaches to the next academic year. As individuals settle into their roles and as we strategize to improve communication, strengthen trust and relationships, and ultimately work toward our common goal of effectively educating our students, this next year is critical in so many ways. I look forward to the work at hand and see this Academic Affairs team striving to improve from the progress that was laid last year.

I am so appreciative of the work we get to do and the individuals I get to work with daily. Thank you for the opportunity.

Charlie Roche, Patrick Walton and I are attending the Enrollment Management Academy in San Diego. Together, we are looking for ways to recover our enrollment from the loss during the pandemic. Fortunately, we have been given hold harmless; but it is critical we look at every opportunity to bring students to our institution whether in person or online. We look forward to the ideas we will bring back to implement immediately.

Career and Technical Education (CTE): Things never slowdown in the CTE Department! We are in full swing with online summer Alcohol, Drug and Human Services, Early Childhood Education, Computer Science, Accounting, and Economics courses. Our Paramedic students are participating in their clinicals throughout the state before heading into their internships in fall. Our Law Enforcement program, in collaboration with the Siskiyou County Probation Department, just completed the two-week Juvenile Correction Officer to Deputy Probation Officer Transfer Academy with 24 participants from all over California. And finally, on July 5th, the Administration of Justice program began the next Police Academy.

In August, Siskiyou Childcare Council will be moving into the Discovery Child Development Center (DCDC) on the Weed campus. DCDC is a collaboration between the College of the Siskiyous Early Childhood Education Program and Siskiyou Childcare Council. The Center will offer a full-day preschool for children three years through kindergarten aged, and surround care program for the families of College of the Siskiyous and the surrounding communities. The DCDC program is subsidized for qualified families. In addition to the preschool program, DCDC serves as a California State Mentor Teacher site and Lab School for the COS Early Childhood Education program and meets NAEYC Accreditation Standards. DCDC is licensed through the State of California Department of Social services. In addition to being the Lab School for the early childhood education program, the DCDC will also be used as a "site" to meet the LVN's pediatric growth and development hours. College of the Siskiyous License Vocational Nursing Program requires 18 hours per student of Growth and Development observation in a Preschool or Nursery School setting. This is equivalent to two full days of observation for our second semester LVN students at an approved facility.

In other exciting news, the CTE department, in partnership with local community partners and other COS programs, including SiskiyouWorks, SMART, and Siskiyou Adult Education, have been collaborating on the development of the College of the Siskiyou Career Center. The Career Center, to be piloted in the fall, will offer career exploration services, work readiness, work-based learning opportunities (including paid/unpaid internships), and job placement for students, either directly or by referral to a partner organization. We are excited to be able to offer students these expanded services to assist in meeting their career goals.

Non-Credit & Community Education: Noncredit - English as a Second Language (ESL) is being offered during summer session and will be offered during the fall semester as well. The instructor, Ignacio Bucio, works well with the students and develops a strong bond with them. We anticipate this will be an ongoing class. This class is not limited to Spanish speakers. Community Ed - Just a reminder to contact the Community Education (COME) office if you would like to attend/teach a class not offered through Credit or Noncredit. Contract Education - Contract Education (CE) works with employers so their workforce is trained. Sometimes that means training and other times it involves doing an assessment, developing a training plan, finding funding assistance, and training the employees. Library: The Library is testing three new databases for AY22-23. Two are article databases covering science topics: *Science Full Text Select* and *Environment Complete* (both from EBSCO). The third database is ProQuests' *Research Companion* with video tutorials on research and information literacy topics such as choosing a topic, incorporating and citing sources, and evaluating sources. These videos can be used as a database, streamed during in-person classes, and embedded into Canvas courses. All are available from the Library's <u>Articles & Databases page</u> and videos from the Research Companion are being incorporated into the <u>Research Help page</u> as well.

Library staff assisted researchers from the Mt. Shasta Sisson Museum for one of this summer's new displays, "Celebrating 100 Years: Sierra Club Foundation Shasta Alpine Hut." Stop by the Museum this summer to check it out! The Mount Shasta Collection's books, articles, photos, and other materials frequently support the Museum's new exhibit development.
