- Approved all requested items submitted through the Continuous Quality Improvement Proposal (CQIP) process and commenced purchasing of approved items.

# **Administrative Services**

**Bookstore:** A warm welcome to Sara Montgomery, our new Bookstore Director! Her first day was December 1 and she is working hard to get up to speed. We look forward to working with her and hearing of great things happening in the bookstore.

Facilities and Maintenance: Please join us in welcoming the newest member to the custodial team, Laura Giordanengo!

Upcoming Projects -

- The LRC restroom remodel flooring is complete and we are waiting on new counter tops, sinks, faucets and toilets. All fixtures will be touchless. Thank you for your patience during the construction.
- The HVAC addition to the Kitchen has been delayed due to health issues with the vendor. The vendor will complete the project when the crew is healthy.
- The Science Building sprinkler repairs are moving forward with Nichols, Melburg, and Rosetto, the original architects that designed the building.
- Construction of one walk-in freezer was approved and work will begin in spring 2023.

Projects in Design -

• The Theater Arts project is in the preliminary design phase. Understanding we will trigger the seismic rehabilitation 50% rule creating additional steps in the design process. An Evaluation and Design Criteria Report (EDCR) will be submitted to DSA for approval. Once the EDCR is completed the District will hire a

commercial testing company to perform the assessment for the report to be completed and incorporated into the working drawing phase of the project.

• The Student Housing Project is in the budget creation phase with the Construction Manager, Project Manager, and Architect. Once we have a cost per square foot for the correct amount of proposed beds, we will begin the design meetings with the larger group. Similar to the Theater Arts project the budget in today's construction climate is a concern.

In-House Projects:

• Office of Civil Rights corrections are ongoing and being addressed through contracted construction and in house maintenance staff.

Other News:

- The formal bid process for one or two new busses has begun and the award date is scheduled for January 16, 2023.
- A part-time custodian for the Yreka campus has been approved and will be implemented as soon as possible.
- Committee approved the purchase of one food concession trailer for further design.

**Technology Services:** Technology Services is pleased to announce Joe Weatherton has been hired as our new Systems Administrator effective January 1, 2023. Joe's previous position, Systems Support Specialist, is being retired in place of this 'more' advanced position that better meets the College's technology needs. Congratulations, Joe!

- DegreeWorks has been successfully upgraded to version 5.0.6. Thanks to all those who have worked with us to make this a success.
- The department is currently imaging 75 laptops that will be used for a permanent Student Laptop Checkout Program that will begin prior to the spring 2023 term.

At the start of the calendar year, Technology Services will begin implementing a new workstation standard on all employee computers. This standard will ensure that all systems are running current software, properly secured, and easily recoverable. Staff will be reaching out to all departments to schedule times to implement this standard at a time that minimizes disruption to their operations.

Earlier in the month, we served homemade soups and grilled cheese as part of our Thankful Thursday event on November 3. December is a busy month for Basecamp. On December 8, we hosted our 'Whobilation' holiday party in Basecamp! Here is to hoping that sneaky Grinch is not lurking around! We will also be hosting a few de-stress events during finals week, and some special furry friends may be on campus!

**Financial Aid:** After payment due notices were sent out, thirty or more students with outstanding Lodge balances were guided through next steps in becoming aid eligible. Other students with outstanding balances are encouraged to seek assistance at the Financial Aid Office window. Final scheduled disbursement will take place December 9. Students who have a completed file will be paid that date.

Students who complete their file later may still be paid for fall 2022 classes, but funds will be issued after their enrollment begins again with the spring 2023 semester.

The deadline has passed for students to request a federal Direct Loan who intend to cease attending after fall. Students continuing in spring 2023 can still be paid for the entire school year.

**Outreach and Retention:** Check out our <u>slide show of events and activities</u> that took place during the fall semester. Events and activities include photos from Trunk or Treats held in Ft. Jones and Weed, where over 300 COS swag bags were distributed; Staff attended College Fairs in October and made over 1,000 contacts; Preview Day 2022 was a lot of fun. Approximately 150 local high school seniors attend the event held at the Weed Campus (special thanks to all who participated in this event). Additionally, we are working on a new View Book for the College and have been in touch with a virtual college tour company.



**Dual Enrollment:** Introductory letters have been mailed to all Siskiyou and Modoc high schools and continuation schools. The same letter was sent to all CTE high school instructors in Siskiyou and Modoc High Schools. Outreach with one on one meetings are being scheduled with our local high schools to discuss ideas on how to increase concurrent and dual enrollment in their schools.

**TRIO:** Greetings from TRIO! It has brought our team so much happiness to serve students in-person and to begin visiting four-year campuses again. Within collaborative efforts between Outreach & Retention, Basecamp and TRiO we have provided several on and off campus activities for students. One of TRiO's strengths is college and career preparation and we were able to serve over 100 high school and college students by participating in Preview Days for Cal Poly Humboldt, CSU Chico and Southern Oregon. Our on-campus events have consisted of cookie decorating, movie showings and pancake Thursdays. ## **Academic Affairs**

#### Liberal Arts – submitted by Val Roberts, Amanda Thomas, Ido Isler, Emkay Sikora, Carly Zeller, and Jude Baldwin

**Fine Arts:** Mr. Robles (a former COS student) brought his 7<sup>th</sup> grade science class from Weed Elementary to the college for a visit. They had recently completed a unit on light, and came to the art department to make cyanotypes. Cyanotype is an iron-based photographic process with a chemical formula that is sensitive to UV light and the upper end of the visual spectrum. Amanda Thomas, our Instructional Support Specialist for Fine Arts, gave the class a brief overview and history of the process, which has been used in both artistic and scientific applications since its discovery in the mid 1800's, and continued to be relevant in contemporary art to this day. For their negatives, the students made drawings on transparencies. In two session, the group exposed the students' cyanotype paper and they saw their images gradually appear on the paper as they were being processed in the darkroom. The students were an enthusiastic group, and we hope to continue to bridge with Weed and other elementary schools.

**Science:** Mr. Robles' 7<sup>th</sup> grade science class also worked with Ido Isler, our Instructional Support Specialist for Science to learn about chemistry. Two groups of students, 15 per group, made "bouncy balls" using glue, borax, and cornstarch. They also watched demonstrations – one group saw screaming gummy bears, and one group saw zinc pyrotechnics!

Academic Success Center (ASC): In addition to providing continued support to our students, the ASC is also adding a little holiday fun to their lives by encouraging students to participate in the daily elf-on-the-shelf search. Whoever finds the elf gets a prize. There is also a "guess the amount of candy is in the candy jar" game. This fun is happening Monday-Thursday until the end of finals week, and is open to all members of the COS community.

**Library:** The ASB hosted a successful Open Mic Night on November 30 with karaoke, games, movies, and food in the Library Lounge (upstairs). The Library was able to test their new projector and moveable tables, and students were able to test the new beanbag chairs. If you are looking for an evening event space (or not-to-rowdy daytime event), ask about using the Lounge. It is a nice and comfortable space!

The Library has been putting up themed fiction displays this fall, starting with horror and scary books for October and books by Native American authors for November. December's display features fiction that takes place at the winter holidays including Solstice, Hanukkah, Diwali, and Christmas. Stop by and check out a fun holiday read!

Library and ASC: The LRC is THE place to study for finals!

- The week before finals (Dec 5-9), the ASC will be open 9:00am 8:00pm Monday Thursday, and 9:00am 12:00pm on Friday. Tutors will be available to assist students until 8:00pm Monday Thursday. Snacks will also be available!
- Sunday, Dec 11, the Library will be open 12:00pm 7:00pm with an ASC tutor available!
- Finals week (Dec 12-15), the Library will be open 8:00am 8:00pm Monday Wednesday, and 8:00am 5:00pm on Thursday. The ASC will be open 9:00am 6:00pm Monday and Wednesday, and 9:00am 5:00pm Tuesday and Thursday.
- Thanks to Basecamp, during all weekdays (Dec 5-15) starting at 3:30pm and during Sunday hours, coffee, tea, and snacks will be available in the LRC Lobby until the ASC or Library closes.

### **Academic Senate**

Hi Everyone,

I would like to highlight another faculty member who puts in extra effort to support her students. Jayne Turk has a practice of hosting a "make-up" day on a Saturday or Sunday every semester. I came upon her make-up day when I swung by my office on a Sunday in early November. I witnessed students busily getting their assignments done or practicing their speeches with Jayne and her student aides taking time to help everyone. Although students were being productive, the atmosphere was relaxed and inviting. Jayne had made a big batch of chicken noodle soup so the availability of warm food and assistance made the setting fun and comfortable even though academic work was taking place. Thanks, Jayne, for taking time to help (and feed) our students so they succeed!

I also want to mention the efforts of administrators and faculty working collaboratively to get things done. First, Dr. Nathan Rexford created a student survey to assess students' academic needs with input from Academic Senate. We appreciate Dr. Rexford working closely with our faculty when constructing the student survey. We hope the student survey will produce data that will inform us about scheduling and other academic areas.

Second, I would like to send a "shout out" of thanks to the Faculty Prioritization Taskforce who put forth recommendations for hiring faculty members, which were approved by IPB before the Thanksgiving Break. Administrators and faculty worked collaboratively to recognize where faculty hires were most needed and prioritized accordingly. I especially want to recognize Mark Klever who came up with the Faculty Prioritization Taskforce last year, which has made this faculty hiring prioritization process more cooperative and efficient. Although I am pleased that we are going through with five faculty hires immediately, I hope we consider additional faculty hires that offer opportunities for enrollment growth (e.g., Faculty Athletic Trainer, Art Instructor).

One area that faculty and administrators have failed to work collaboratively on is Program Review. The Academic Senate has requested I write a letter to the President and Administrators to share our concerns about the lack of adherence to the Program Review process and timeline. There are a series of steps that were supposed to occur last spring, summer, and early fall that were not followed. Program Reviews are necessary because it allows for courses / programs to be improved, as well as it should drive our budget priorities. Finally, Program Review is required to meet accreditation standards outlined by ACCJC. In order for the Program Review process to be a success, it necessitates a commitment from administrators, faculty, and the Office of Research and Assessment. Given the importance of the Program Review process, we need to make a concerted effort that important deadlines are not missed, and communication occurs regularly. We are hoping for confirmation by Administrators that the process agreed upon in the Program Review manual will be followed going forward.
