Congratulations to our newest Tenured Faculty!

Ann Womack, Biology Instructor - Ann earned a Bachelor in Sciences degree in Microbiology from Southern Illinois University and a PhD in Biology from the University of Oregon (UO) at the Institute for Ecology and Evolutionary Biology. She discovered her love of teaching while at UO, where she taught many laboratory courses as well as a microbiology lecture course. Prior to joining COS in winter 2019, Ann was a Postdoctoral Researcher with the USDA Agricultural Research Service in Adams, OR where she worked educating farmers about the importance of soil biology and advances in the field of soil microbiology.

At COS, Ann teaches a variety of Biology courses including Introduction to Life Science and Microbiology. A new course, Ecology and Evolution in Society, which is closely related to her research interests and expertise is in development and planned for debut in fall 2023. In addition to teaching, Ann is active in several committees on campus including the Open Educational Resources Workgroup, Equivalency, and other short-term taskforces and hiring committees. She is also the current Academic Senate Secretary.



Carly Zeller, Academic Success Center Coordinator and Instructor - Learning assistance is at the core of Carly's career in higher education. Her appreciation for the discipline began in 2006 in a 'cramped, glorified closet' at Cuyamaca Community College called 'The Writing Center' when she took a position as a staff tutor. There, she witnessed what could have been 'perceived' as boundaries of culture, socio-economic standing, and age crumble to create strong communities in which the process of learning was supported and celebrated. That experience led Carly to seek a career as a community college instructor.

Carly has worked in community college public relations; as an adjunct English instructor for Cuyamaca College and College of the Siskiyous (COS); in interim roles as College of the Siskiyous' ASC Coordinator; as the COS Basic Skills Initiative Coordinator; and as an @ONE Course Facilitator. She holds a Master of Fine Arts degree in Writing from Pacific University and a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from California State, Long Beach as well

as a @ONE for Training Online Teaching Certificate. Additionally, Carly holds a National College Learning Center Association Leadership Level III Certificate, which exemplifies her commitment to the power of learning support to help students realize their worth, recognize their strengths, and empower them to start thinking of themselves as academic insiders rather than academic outsiders.

Siskiyou County has been Carly's home since 2007. She met her husband through a COS connection and was married with COS colleagues by her side. She and her husband love this community and feel fortunate to have the opportunity to raise their children in this paradise of outdoor adventures. Reach University Partnership - I am happy to announce Siskiyous has recently collaborated with Reach University, which gives our employees the opportunity to pursue a Bachelor's in Liberal Arts degree at a minimal cost.

Program Eligibility:

- Currently employed at College of the Siskiyous (in any position)
- Associate's degree (in any discipline). Siskiyous graduates are guaranteed 100% transfer of credits towards the Bachelor's Degree.
- Access to technology (to attend synchronous classes offered after work hours)
- Ability to dedicate 15 hours/week towards on-the-job experiences related to instructional activities (tutoring, mentoring, coaching, etc...)

Student Services

Vice President of Student Services: This month I was able to attend the Chief Student Services Officer Conference in Los Angeles along with JonJon Junpradub, Austin Toney, and Maggie Crowder. As we met with Student Services personnel from across the state, we were able to gain valuable insight into how to serve our students well and where we can improve. There are areas of Student Services that we have opportunities to capitalize in how we serve our students. We have a truly marvelous team at Siskiyous and I know that together we will continue to meet the needs of our students and continually evaluate where we can improve. I look forwarding to bringing home ideas and knowledge gained from this important conference. In the future, I will look for more opportunities to take more Student Services staff and faculty to these important gatherings.

We are midway through the semester now and we have accomplished much. We have reduced our non-resident tuition rate, reduced costs for our Oregon Exchange students, and reduced tuition for students from out of state taking fewer than six units. We are currently implementing ConexED and are excited for what it will add to our student experience. Thank you, Regina Weston, for your leadership on this project. The Transfer Center is starting to flourish again and Liz Jungermann has held our first transfer event for this semester. Staff are attending professional development opportunities across the state. We continue to evaluate how to create and structure our new housing project. We are busy and we are actively engaged in helping students. We are grateful for the opportunities we have each day to serve. It is truly a blessing to work in Student Services.

EOPS, CARE, CalWORKs:

- EOPS held five group orientations this semester, as well as six one-on-one orientations, and ten students completed their orientations online.
- With one week to go, 89% of students have completed their first Counselor contact and calls have been made to the remaining 11% in order to schedule their appointment.
- All students who completed orientation received a semester starter kit that includes a backpack full of school supplies as well as a planner and a \$25 gas voucher.
- First Progress Check-ins are happening now and 73% of students have already completed theirs and received another \$25 gas voucher. Students who are receiving an unsatisfactory grade in any of their classes will meet with their EOPS Counselor to create an Academic Success Plan.
- CalWORKs currently has eight participants who received a book voucher ranging from \$195 to \$490. These
 students also receive \$50 per month in gas vouchers as well as a backpack full of school supplies and
 ongoing school supplies as the semester goes on.

Lodges: Lodge staff are working with Campus Food Services to provide better meal availability during campus closures and holidays. Recruitment and hiring for a new Resident Assistant and Lodge Government Representative is also underway.

Outreach and Recruitment: Last month, during the week of February 13-16, Outreach and Recruitment hosted a variety of activities in the Student Center recognized 'Week of Happiness.' Students were able to paint rocks, create essential oil bracelets, decorate donuts, and get tips on happiness or community resources for assistance.

The campus community is encouraged to visit the John Mantle Student Center and view the new Tribal display generously on loan from the Karuk Tribe. The display will be updated every three months and the Karuk Tribe is sending a map of northern California tribes to place above it. Things like this assist in making our indigenous students feel welcome on campus and increases retention. Also, while you are in the Student Center, be sure to check out the new digital display highlighting upcoming events, activities, and important dates. The display screen is located in next to the water fountain.

Administrative Services

Facilities, Maintenance, & Operations: A number of projects are underway and several are scheduled to begin soon. New carpet in Eddy Hall will be completed during Spring Break, March 27-31. During this time, counseling staff will work remotely. Also during Spring Break, the final portion of the LRC restroom remodel will take place. Both restrooms will be closed during construction. Countertops will be replaced and new sinks with touchless fixtures installed.

The Theater Arts Project preliminary plan has been submitted to the Chancellors Office for review. The review process can take up to six months for approval to move forward with working drawings.

The Student Housing Project team continues to work on designing an acceptable space within our grant-funded budget. Information from recent discussions with the Department of Finance will be shared with the campus community very soon.

Coming soon... a new Welcome Center will be constructed in the RHSI building on the Yreka Campus giving students better access to registration services.

It was followed by a lively panel discussion with our fabulous full-time Science instructors who shared their experiences as women in the sciences and answered questions from seventeen audience members. It was a wonderful event! It was a busy month for the Fire Program. The 44th Fire Academy completed their Fire Control 3/Live Fire Phase. The Cadets are put through rigorous live-fire scenarios in which the Mike Wilson Fire Tower becomes a building involved under a 5-Alarm fire. The Cadets operate to extinguish the fire in real-time scenarios. This is when all the training they have learned up to this point comes together. They completed all of their manipulative testing and are now moving into the Wildland Module.

The Fire Technology Program also recently hosted the Two-In, Fire-Out group and conducted an Engine Company Operations class. The course focuses on basic fire-ground engine company hose-line functions. Many of the local fire departments participated.









Despite the incredible snowstorm, the Level 1 Avalanche Course still commenced and experience epic conditions! We are starting to build an enrollment list for the 45th Academy Class for the 2023-2024 school year.

This month our faculty spotlight is recognizing two amazing women who have earned their tenure this year...Ann Womack and Carly Zeller. Congratulations Ladies! I cannot say enough good things about them. They both are great colleagues who really care about their students.

Dr. Ann Womack is a full-time Biology Instructor on campus. She is passionate about her job and helping students. I recently featured Ann in the January 2023 Campus Connection when she volunteered to absorb students from another biology class into her class when the part-time instructor could not complete their course. This ensured students could complete their biology course and not be 'left in the lurch.' Aside from being a great teacher, Ann also serves on a bunch of committees. One of her many committee responsibilities is serving as the Secretary of



the Senate Exec. She is phenomenal in this role. She takes comprehensive notes, diligently meets her obligations, and, most importantly, gives great advice to the Senate Exec (me in particular (a)). I am grateful that I get to work with her closely in this capacity because I value her support and guidance.

Carly Zeller is the Academic Success Center (ASC) Coordinator and Instructor. Under her leadership, the ASC has transformed into an AMAZING student-centered hub of learning support. With the help of the Tutor Coordinator (Emkay Sikora), the ASC provides students with comprehensive in-person and remote tutoring services. Aside from being the ASC Coordinator, Carly teaches English courses and is involved in many committees. She brings invaluable information to these meetings and her queries often facilitate the committee (including me!) to consider things from a different perspective. Carly and Ann have shown themselves to be incredible assets to our college community and we are lucky to have them (3)

In addition to recognizing our newly tenured Faculty, the month's Faculty Member Spotlight is focused on the entire Life and Physical Science department. In celebration of Women's History Month, the Biology instructors, Ann Womack, Shannamar Dewey, and Alison Varty, along with the Chemistry instructor, Jenny Heath, participated in a panel discussion hosed by the Library on March 15 focusing on "Women in Science." This talk

highlighted women's contributions to the scientific fields and encouraged girls/women to pursue STEM careers. Jude Baldwin and Liz Jungermann also faculty, helped in the coordination of this Women's History Month event.
